

What is the structure, size, and composition of the Board of Directors?

The composition of the 15-member Board of Directors (the "Board" includes:

- The Immediate Past Board Chair
- The Chair of the National Team Steering Committee
- Five "10-Year Athletes" (as defined in the U.S. Olympic & Paralympic Committee ("USOPC") Bylaws and USA Swimming Rules & Regulations) directly elected by all other 10-Year Athletes, including the USOPC Team USA Athletes' Commission Representative, the USOPC Team USA Athletes' Commission Alternate, and three At-Large 10-Year Athletes
- Seven At-Large members elected by the House of Delegates ("HOD"), at least three of whom must be coaches and at least two of whom must be Independent If the Immediate Past Board Chair was originally elected by the House of Delegates ("HOD") as an At-Large member, they may fulfill the Independent requirement.

Which Board positions will be elected this year?

Three At-Large members, at least two of whom must be coaches, and one 10-Year Athlete member. The HOD will elect the At-Large members, and 10-Year Athletes will elect the 10-Year Athlete member.

When does the election take place?

On September 27, the HOD will elect the At-Large members. The 10-Year Athlete member will be elected via an online vote from September 19 to September 26. USA Swimming will announce the winners of both elections on September 27 at the annual meeting of the HOD.

How long are the terms of the Directors?

Four years.

Who elects the Board officers?

The Board elects its officers (Board Chair, Vice-Chair, and Vice-Chair Fiscal Oversight) from among its members.

How did the Nominating Committee vet and recommend nominees?

All proposed nominees submitted a detailed application form, with content addressing their educational and career background, connection with swimming, and experience in positions of leadership (board or management). The Secretary & General Counsel screened all candidates to ensure that they met the eligibility and good standing requirements. Each member of the Nominating Committee reviewed all applications and preliminarily scored (using a uniform matrix) the candidates. The Committee then identified those candidates with the strongest experience and qualifications, and those exemplifying the skills and attributes of Board members identified in Board policies. Additionally, the Committee focused on the Board Charge. The Board Charge is guidance for the Nominating Committee, which the Board developed and voted on at its Q1 meeting. The Board Charge specifies the following experience, skills, and attributes that constitute "ideal candidates" to complement and augment the composition of the incumbent Board in the upcoming nominations/election cycle.

The Board is seeking the following expertise and background for the available seats:

10-Year Athlete

- Experience/interest in college swimming and the changing NCAA environment
- Existing governance experience to understand the complexity and some of the stakeholders
- Post-swimming job experience (or "while-swimming" job experience)
- Time & commitment to the sport and to this volunteer Board position

Coach

Pursuant to Bylaw 4.2, the Board must have a minimum of three voting coach members. Thus, the Board is seeking successful coaches who (1) is currently leading a thriving USA Swimming Club, (2) has governance experience through service on USA Swimming national committees, and (3) demonstrates a track record of coaching athletes at all levels of USA Swimming competition. The Board has also emphasized the importance of coach members who have led a fiscally and strategically sound club.

After collaborative review of each applicant, the Committee invited candidates to interview with Committee members. All interviews were recorded, and each Committee member reviewed all interviews. The Committee then discussed the candidates' responses to standard questions and shared their impressions of the candidates. After extensive deliberations, the Committee conducted reference checks for each of the candidates before official nominating them to the ballot.

JACK BAUERLE



Jack Bauerle has experienced unparalleled success in all facets of coaching life at the University of Georgia. National champions, All-Americans, record-setters, Olympians, Scholar All-Americans, and NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients have become the norm under Bauerle, who has spent 43 seasons as the helm of the program.

In his time overseeing Georgia's program, Bauerle has produced seven NCAA and 12 SEC crowns with

the Lady Bulldogs, with 62 different men and women team members winning 175 national championships. In his tenure, 304 Georgia student-athletes have accumulated 2,116 All-America citations, while Bauerle himself has been chosen as the SEC Coach of the Year 18 times (16 with the women, two with the men) and the National Women's Coach of the Year on seven occasions.

In 2008, Bauerle reached the pinnacle of his coaching success when he was chosen as the United States' women's team coach for the Olympics, leading the American women to 14 medals, the most of any nation. Including Beijing, he has coached for Team USA at six Olympic Games, serving as a women's assistant in 2000, men's assistant in 2016 and 2020, and personal coach in 2004 and 2012.

Under Bauerle's leadership, Georgia has produced 87 Olympians representing 20 different nations, earning 38 medals in the process. Georgia swimmers have earned 15 Gold Medals, beginning with Sheila Taormina in the 4x200m freestyle relay at the 1996 Atlanta Games. At the 2000 Sydney Games, Kristy Kowal became the first individual medalist as she took Silver in the 200m breaststroke, while in 2012, Allison Schmitt became the program's first individual Gold Medalist when she won the 200m freestyle in London.

At the Rio games, Bulldog swimmers totaled seven medals, including the program's first male medalists in Chase Kalisz (silver – 400m IM) and Gunnar Bentz (gold – 4x200m freestyle relay). Bauerle was joined in Rio by 12 Georgia swimming alums representing the USA, Canada, and Finland, along with former diving coach Dan Laak and volunteer diving assistant Cesar Castro representing

In Tokyo, a contingent of 10 Bulldogs, as well as Coach Laak, joined Bauerle at the Olympic Aquatics Centre. Starting a run of seven medals won at the meet, Kalisz and teammate Jay Litherland led a 1-2 sweep of the 400m IM, giving Georgia its first male gold medalist in an individual event. Schmitt, competing in her fourth games, earned two medals and brought her career total to 10, while Hali Flickinger earned a pair of bronze medals in the 400m IM and 200m butterfly. Additionally, two members of Bauerle's pro group medaled as Andrew Wilson won gold in the 4x100m medley relay and Natalie Hinds took silver in the 4x100m freestyle relay.

Bauerle has been inducted into the State of Georgia, the Georgia Aquatics and the Montgomery County (Pa.) Coaches halls of fame. He also received the Bill Hartman Award, which is one of the highest honors given to a former UGA student-athlete based on 20 years of excellence in his profession.

Jack Bauerle served as the head coach of the University of Georgia Swimming and Diving program for 43 years. Under his leadership, UGA athletes captured 7 NCAA national championships and earned 41 Olympic medals. Jack was the head coach of the 2008 U.S. Women's Olympic Team and served as an assistant coach

for the 2000, 2016, and 2020 Olympic teams, as well as on the National Team Steering Committee. He also led the Athens Bulldogs USA Swimming club. In his role at UGA, Jack oversaw all aspects of program management, including staffing, budgeting, fundraising, alumni relations, and recruiting.



BILLY DOUGHTY

Billy Doughty is the CEO/Head Swim Coach of DART Swimming in California. Billy was named Head Coach of DART Swimming in 2009. DART is currently a Silver Medal Club with over 400 USA Swimming members across three sites in the Sacramento region. DART also manages aquatic complexes and operates additional aquatic programming, including multiple swim schools, summer day camps, a summer league recreational team, and a water polo program.

Under Billy's leadership over the past 16 years, DART has experienced significant financial growth, expanded programming, and increased athlete membership at all levels of the program. Billy was the only full-time employee in 2009. At that time, DART operated out of two community pools in Davis, California. DART now utilizes nine facilities, including the recently built North Natomas Aquatic Center, host of the 2025 TYR Pro-Series meet. Billy oversees a full-time staff of eight employees and eighty part-time employees. Billy also has experience hosting major USA Swimming meets, including TYR Pro-Series and Futures Championships.

During Billy's time with DART, he has overseen a number of high-performance swimmers who have been successful at the national, international, and collegiate level, including 2024 Olympian and 2025 World Champion (200 Fly) Luca Urlando and US National Team members Chris Wieser and Emma Barksdale. DART has had three individual and relay teams break National Age Group records.

Billy has served in numerous coaching roles with USA Swimming, including Head USA Coach for World Juniors 2019 (Budapest, Hungary), Assistant USA Coach for the Junior Pan Pacs 2018 (Fiji), and Assistant USA Coach for Mel Zajac 2018 (Vancouver, British Columbia). Billy has been named to the USA National and National Junior Coaches list consistently since 2015.

Billy currently serves on the USA Swimming Senior Development Committee, a position he has held since 2023. Billy previously served on the Sierra Nevada LSC Board of Directors for 10 years. In addition, Billy held leadership positions with Southeastern Swimming LSC and Pacific Swimming LSC.

Billy began his full-time coaching career in 2002 with a team that is now known as Palo Alto Stanford Aquatics. From 2006-2009, Billy worked as the Head Coach of the City of Mobile Swim Association in Mobile, Alabama.

Billy grew up swimming in Nashville, Tennessee and Huntsville, Alabama. Billy swam for Clemson University. Billy has been married to his wife, Jen (also a former swimmer at Duke), for 22 years. They have two boys, ages 19 and 16. Billy's oldest son is a Division 1 collegiate water polo player and his youngest son hopes to continue his basketball career at the collegiate level after high school. The Doughty family enjoys camping with friends anywhere near water.

Billy would bring a wealth of knowledge to the USA Swimming Board of Directors, including coaching experience at the national and international



levels, proven acumen running multiple aquatic-focused businesses, knowledge about operating diverse aquatic programming, and significant expertise running elite-level swim meets.

Change is coming in swimming (Collegiate Swimming) and USA Swimming needs to be ready to pivot. Billy will bring a commitment to elite USA club swimming with a unique financial aquatic background to ensure this success.

CLARK HAMMOND

I'm Clark R. Hammond, a dedicated attorney with over 40 years of experience, seeking re-election to the USA Swimming Board of Directors. My passion for swimming began as a young athlete in AAU meets and later water polo and was reignited in 1989 when my daughter joined year-round swimming. Since then, I've served in leadership roles from local clubs to the national level, deeply connected to the community you all represent.

My volunteer roles reflect my commitment to you. At the club level, I held various offices and was a board member. In my LSC, I've served as treasurer, secretary, Safe Sport Coordinator (current), and Officials Committee member. At the Zone level, I served as the Officials Chair. Nationally, I chaired the Rules & Regulations Committee, Nationals Officials Committee, and the first Nominating Committee, shaping policies that impact your daily efforts. I've officiated at all levels, from novice meets to the Olympic Trials (2008, 2012, 2016 and 2021 as Meet Referee) and internationally at World Championships meets held in Istanbul, Turkey and Kazan, Russia.

With a BBA in Economics (University of Miami, 1975) and JD (Cumberland School of Law, 1984), I serve on my firm's executive committee, overseeing strategic planning, budgets, compliance, and risk management. As a mediator, I bring people together to solve tough problems—skills vital for the 2025 Board Charge, which emphasizes strategic oversight, financial stewardship, and addressing challenges like NIL's impact on college swimming. These align directly with your work in coaching, competing, officiating, and volunteering.

As your current Director and also as a previous Director (2015-2018), I helped guide USA Swimming toward a stronger future. In my first term, we reduced the Board from 35 to 15 members, allowing staff to manage operations while we focused on priorities like safety, inclusivity, and growth—issues that matter to every coach, athlete, official, and volunteer. Currently, I serve as the chair of the Executive Compensation Committee of the board. My experience as a swimmer, official, and volunteer equips me to advance our mission of excellence while ensuring safe, inclusive environments for all.

Since 1989, I have been advocating for coaches, athletes, officials, and volunteers like you, always prioritizing decisions that benefit our entire swimming community. In every issue and decision before the board, I've

worked with the best interest of our members in mind, ensuring that your needs, voices, and well-being drive every choice we make. I'm confident that my legal skills, strategic thinking, and passion for swimming will help us keep our team on track. I'm committed to ensuring that we have the appropriate structure, leadership, and allocation of our financial and other resources. Additionally, I'm dedicated to continuously seeking opportunities to elevate our sport to new heights.

BRENT LANG

Brent Lang is a lifelong swimmer, seasoned business executive, and mentor who brings a unique blend of competitive swimming experience and proven leadership in both the private sector and the Olympic movement.

Brent grew up as an age-group swimmer in Beaverton, Oregon, where he swam for the Tualatin Hills Swim Club. His older brother was also a swimmer, and his

dad was a meet official and served as club president. When Brent was 11, his family moved to the island of Guernsey in the English Channel, where he won two British National Age Group Championships before moving back to Oregon for high school.

He attended the University of Michigan and swam for Coach Jon Urbanchek, who had a lasting impact on Brent's development as both an athlete and a person. Brent graduated summa cum laude with a degree in industrial and operations engineering and was a four-time NCAA champion. He was a member of the 1988 U.S. Olympic Team, winning a gold medal as a member of the 4x100 Freestyle Relay at the Seoul Olympics. He also won gold for Team USA at the World University Games (1987), Pan Pacific Games (1989), and World Championships (1991).

Brent began his business career as a management consultant before earning his MBA from Stanford. After graduating, he immersed himself in the high-tech world of Silicon Valley and spent the next 27 years building and scaling technology companies.

He spent nine years as CEO and board member of Vocera Communications (NYSE:VCRA), a leader in communication and workflow solutions for hospitals, until the company was acquired by Stryker in 2022. Previously, he served as president and COO and helped lead the company's successful IPO in 2012. Brent joined Vocera in 2001 as one of its earliest employees, serving as vice president of marketing.



Currently, Brent serves on the board of Outset Medical (NASDAQ:OM), a medical technology company developing hemodialysis systems for hospital and home use. He is also Chair of the Board at Eko Health, maker of digital stethoscopes that leverage AI to help clinicians deliver earlier, more accurate diagnoses of cardiac and pulmonary conditions.

Until December 2024, Brent served as a Director and Treasurer for the USA Gymnastics Board of Directors. He was recruited for the board following the sexual abuse scandal and played a central role in rebuilding the organization's leadership, culture, and reputation—focusing on transparency, athlete safety, financial discipline, and regaining community trust. He also served on the board of Thriveworks, a provider of mental health services, deepening his understanding of athlete well-being, and currently serves on the Leadership Council of the Positive Coaching Alliance, which promotes character-building through positive coaching.

Brent was awarded the CEO World Award in 2014 and the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award in 2015. He lives in Los Altos, California, with his wife and still loves swimming with the local Masters team. Swimming has shaped his life, and he's committed to giving back to the sport that helped define him.

KATE LUNDSTEN

Kate joined the Aquajets Swim Team as Head Coach in 2004 and has been building strong swimmers-and even stronger teams- ever since. A passionate team-builder and lifelong advocate for swimmer development, Kate believes that the power of the team is greater than the strength of any individual-a philosophy that guides every aspect of her coaching. In addition to coaching, she serves as Board Chair of Newjets, Inc., the nonprofit parent organization

of Aquajets, where she leads with a focus on program growth, and building a team-driven culture.

A coach for over 30 years, Kate has proudly represented the U.S. on multiple national team staffs, including Head Women's Coach at the 2017 FINA World Junior Championships, and as an assistant coach for the 2018 Junior Pan Pacs and 2019 Pan Am Games. These roles, along with years of club and high school leadership, have given her a deep understanding of the broader swimming ecosystem- from grassroots development to international competition.

Kate is a passionate advocate for coaches, athletes, and clubs. She understands firsthand what it takes to lead in today's coaching landscape and is committed to ensuring their voices are heard at the national level. Her swimmers have gone on to break records, join National Junior Teams, compete at Olympic Trials, and even win Olympic gold. A former NCAA national champion herself, Kate swam for Hamline University where she earned 24 All-American honors and a national record in the 100 backstroke.

She brings creativity, heart, and a team-first mindset to every role- and sees board service not as a solo opportunity, but a shared responsibility to strengthen USA Swimming for generations to come.

I am honored to be a 2025 candidate for the USA Swimming Board of Directors. Swimming has been a constant in my life—I've been an athlete, coach, lifeguard, parent, official, and dedicated volunteer. Professionally, I bring extensive experience as an executive leader and board member in both for-profit and non-profit organizations. My expertise includes strategy, financial management, technology, and leading change. Having worked in complex multi-

stakeholder environments, I understand the challenge of balancing disparate needs and staying mission-focused while navigating operational, financial, and external challenges.

Professional experience: At Deloitte, I was a senior partner and served as the Global Chief Strategy Officer where I worked with the global CEO, leadership team, and board to develop a transformative strategy and financial plan across the Firm's operations in 150+ countries. Prior to that, I served as the Deloitte US Consulting Chief Strategy Officer, Global Leader for IT Strategy services, and on internal boards. Over the years, I have also worked with World Relief, Twin Cities Habitat for Humanity, and the Minnetonka School District. Currently, I serve on boards, coach executive leaders, and am a member of our school district financial advisory committee.

Interests: Investing in our next generation of youth and adult leaders is important to me. I chose in my doctoral thesis (2024) to explore how high school swim & dive athletes (and their coaches) view leadership and teaming as well as the underlying question of whether youth sports contributed to building those valuable life skills. In 2013, I co-founded Vantage, the nationally recognized experiential learning program at Minnetonka High School. I continue to support Vantage as an entrepreneurship instructor, advisory board chair, and teacher coach. While at Deloitte, I sponsored a networking and learning program for Twin Cities women executives and taught second year MBA students at the UW Madison.

Sports: I swam in Madison, WI with the Badger Dolphins, Shorewood Hills, and University of Wisconsin teams. When our daughter returned to coach the high school team, I resumed working with coaches and high school athletic leaders.
