The German team was given second place in the Olympic finals, however, because its winning scores over the teams it defeated were greater than the winning scores of the American team. The United States team was awarded third place. The championship was won by the Hungarian team.

At the conclusion of the meet Dr. Leo Donath, secretary of the F.I.N.A. who conducted the meet, addressed the capacity gathering and announced that the games were the finest ever held under Olympic Management. He particularly complimented the starting of Capt. Roy E. Davis of Chicago for not making one false start during the entire meet, a record not equaled in the history of Olympic swimming competition.

The details attendant upon the preparation for the tryouts and the management of the teams are without number. For her experienced care and management of the women's team the commendation of the committee is due Miss Charlotte Epstein. Head coach Robert J. H. Kiphuth was an excellent selection. His Olympic experience and his knowledge of swimming well fitted him for the position and his personal interest commanded that respect that produced the best results from those in his charge. There was sincere cooperation from the members of the committee at all times, particularly from Secretary Fred W. Luehring.
